
Square Pegs, in Square Holes

In the 1990 Movie *Crazy People*, Dudley Moore coined the advertising slogan "*Buy Volvos. They are Boxy, but they are Good.*"




Scandinavian architecture reflects the symmetric nature of the Norse mind.
